WORKSHOP OVERVIEW

With the spread of digital technologies, the *terra firma* of scholarly practice is changing rapidly. Yet, academic institutions are slow to change. What happens when digital scholarly practices collide with legacy institutions? In this presentation, Jessie Daniels draws on her experience as a public scholar to offer both a road map and a vision of what being a scholar can be when reimagined in the digital era to enliven the public good.

Jessie Daniels is in Sydney to attend a collaborative workshop with Australian antiracism activists who are engaged in digital strategies to combat racism co-hosted by Alana Lentin and Justine Humphry.

Jessie Daniels is an internationally recognised expert in Internet manifestations of racism. She is the author of five books, including *White Lies* (Routledge, 1997) and *Cyber Racism* (Rowman & Littlefield, 2009), along with dozens of scholarly articles. In 2016 her book *Being a Scholar in the Digital Era* was published by the University of Chicago Press. Since 2007, Daniels has published *Racism Review*, a credible and reliable resource for anyone seeking evidence-based research on race, racism, ethnicity and immigration.
