She is an educator of D'harawal knowledge and has a number of undergraduate and postgraduate degrees in Environmental Sciences. She has publications on D'harawal culture, stories and natural resources. She has made a significant contribution to the Macarthur region in South West Sydney by playing a key role in the development of Campbelltown Hospital, Campbelltown TAFE (Technical and Further Education) vocational college, Mount Annan Botanic Gardens and the University of Western Sydney Campus. Because of her expertise in creating sustainable environments in a highly populated urban area and her direct role in the development of key health and educational sectors in South West Sydney, her knowledge of Indigenist environmental science can make an important contribution to urban and environmental planning in response to climate change.
